This Sunday (12/15), Pastor Craig will bring the Advent message from 1 Samuel 8:1-22



Thank you for your participation in our budget meeting on 12/8 and for your commitment tothe ministries of Shalom! Attached are minutes from our meeting and a copy of the final 2025 Shalom budget.

I want to acknowledge that I feel I did a poor job in leading our congregational meeting on Sunday in one very important way:

- I was unprepared to count and record votes when amendments required congregational approval
 - I should have had someone help me with hand counting, leading to more confidence that my counts were correct.
 - I did not even give Zoom attenders the opportunity to vote on amendments or the final budget.

I regret that I cannot redo portions of our meeting. I trust that God had mercy and caused our decisions to match God's direction, in spite of the flawed process.

I apologize for my failure in that regard, and will seriously consider ways to do better in the future. In Christ, Bob Love

FEATURED PERSON OF COLOR BIO

Born in Washington, D.C. in 1895, **Charles Hamilton Houston** enrolled in Amherst College at the age of 16 and was the only Black student in his class. He earned his bachelor's degree, magna cum laude in 1915. After teaching in Washington, D.C. for two years, Houston joined the then-segregated US Army as an officer. He left in April 1919, just before the Red Summer began.

"The hate and scorn showered on us Negro officers by our fellow Americans convinced me that there was no sense in my dying for a world ruled by them," he later wrote. "I made up my mind that if I got through this war I would study law and use my time fighting for men who could not strike back."

Houston entered Harvard Law School at the tail end of the "Red Summer", a violent period of nationwide racial and social unrest during which Black Americans lost hard-won legal and political gains while experiencing deadly white-on-black violence, especially against Black soldiers returning from World War I. The period also marked one of the first times in U.S. history in which Black communities fought back against such attacks.

When Houston entered Harvard Law School that fall as one of a handful of African Americans, he held the fervent belief that integration was key to the social, political, and economic



success of Black Americans. Houston flourished at Harvard Law School, earning top grades and a coveted position on the editorial board of the Harvard Law Review, the first Black student to do so. He also won the respect of his fellow students, and many of his Black classmates saw him as a leader.

Houston's experience of injustice at home and abroad prompted him upon his return to Washington to join his father's law practice. Renamed Houston & Houston, it was one of the first Black law firms established in Washington, D.C. Houston fervently believed that it was incumbent upon Black lawyers to fight for Black people and Black communities because *"the average white lawyer especially in the South could not be relied upon to wage an uncompromising fight"* for the equal rights of African Americans.

Houston taught part-time at Howard Law School, and in 1929, and was appointed to serve as the law school's vice-dean, though he fulfilled many of the responsibilities of dean. Houston transformed what was then an unaccredited part-time evening program into what Columbia University law professor Jack Greenberg once described as the "West Point of civil rights training."

Houston left Howard in 1935 to serve as the NAACP's first general counsel. He made it his mission to disprove the fallacy of separate but equal" and launched a campaign by Black lawyers around the nation to expose the glaring inequities that Black Americans faced in virtually all aspects of their lives, but particularly education.

Discrimination in education, Houston argued, "is symbolic of all the more drastic discriminations which Negroes suffer in American life. And these apparent senseless discriminations in education against Negroes have a very definite objective on the part of the ruling whites, to curb the young [Blacks] and prepare them to accept an inferior position in American life without protest or struggle."

Houston, who has been called "the man who killed Jim Crow," also won major cases affirming the civil rights of Black Americans in other areas. Of the eight cases that he argued before the U.S. Supreme Court, he won seven. Thurgood Marshall was mentored by Houston.

We beg you to save young America from the blight of race prejudice. Do not bind the children within the narrow circles of your own lives.
